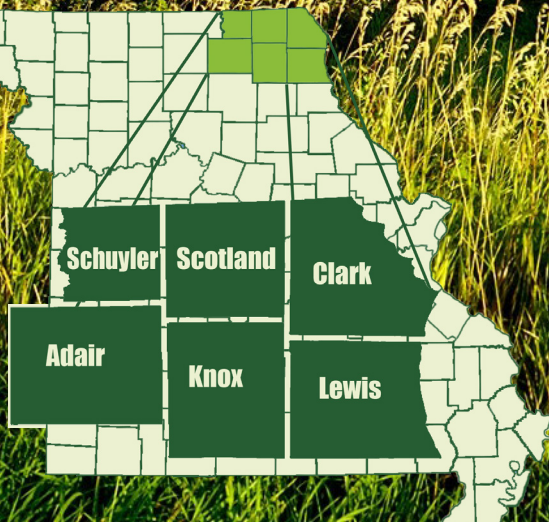

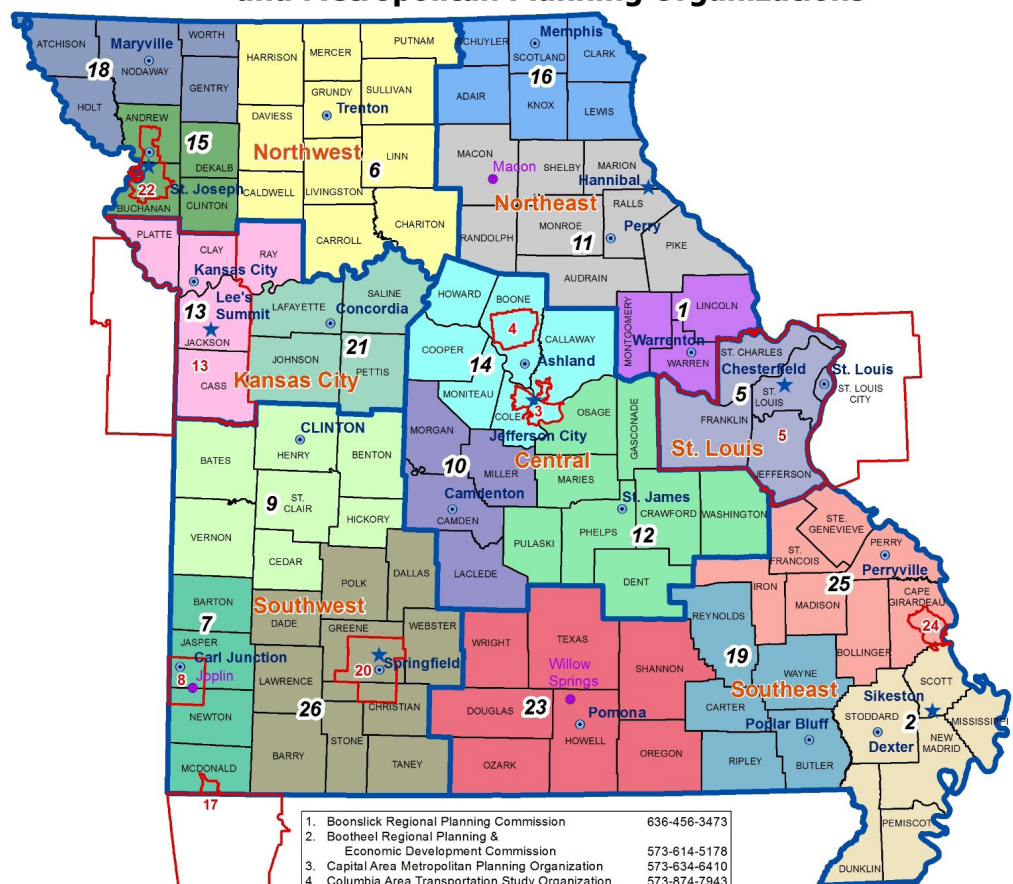

History of the Northeast Missouri Regional Planning Commission

The Northeast Missouri Regional Planning Commission (NEMO RPC) is one of twenty-six regional planning commissions and metropolitan planning organizations in the State of Missouri, which are authorized by the State of Missouri Regional Planning and Community Development Act of 1966, Revised Missouri Statutes Chapter 251. The Regional Planning and Community Development Act of 1966 permitted the establishment of regional planning commissions to formally organize and band together by counties to promote the spirit of cooperatively working together to solve problems and plan the future development of regions and the State of Missouri.

The Northeast Missouri Regional Planning Commission (NEMO RPC) was designated such by the State of Missouri by Governor Warren E. Hearnes on the 19th day of March in 1969. On this date, the Northeast Missouri Regional Planning Commission was created; with the boundaries of the commission's authority to coincide with the boundaries of the counties of Adair, Clark, Knox, Schuyler, and Scotland. The original region served the five counties and 27 incorporated cities for a total of 32-member

governments in Northeast Missouri. During the year of 1992, Lewis County petitioned the State of Missouri and the NEMO RPC membership to join the region. In late 1992, The State of Missouri assigned the County of Lewis to the boundaries of the Northeast Missouri Regional Planning Commission/ Rural Development Corporation and Economic Development District. We now serve Adair, Clark, Knox, Lewis, Schuyler, and Scotland counties and the 33 incorporated cities for a total of 39-member governments in Northeast Missouri.

On December 22, 1975, the Northeast Missouri RPC entered into a cooperative agreement with the Counties of Adair, Clark, Knox, Schuyler and Scotland to formulate the Public Housing Agency (PHA) for the member counties. The Northeast Missouri Regional Planning Commission was designated the administrative agency for the newly formed Public Housing Agency (PHA) and Scotland County was designated as the official signatory lead county to act on behalf of member counties.

On August 16, 1978, the Northeast Missouri Regional Planning Commission incorporated the Northeast Rural Development Corporation (NEMO RDC) to expand the mission and objectives for the region in Northeast Missouri. The Corporation was established as a not-for-profit 501(c) 3 with the same by-laws as the Regional Planning Commission and the Commission and Corporation would be one and the same. On October 2, 1978, the region of Northeast Missouri was designated by the United States Department of Commerce, Economic Development Administration as the Northeast Missouri Economic Development District. This was authorized under Title V of the Public Works and Economic Development Act of 1985 to designate multi-county districts for the purpose of fostering and promoting their economic growth. In February 2013, we moved to our new location at 121 S. Cecil Street, Memphis, MO.

PURPOSE

The six counties of the Commission / Corporation are bound together by Executive Order as the Northeast Missouri Regional Planning Commission. The region shares as local units of government, not only a boundary line as such, but the active spirit of cooperatively working together to solve problems and plan the future development of Northeast Missouri. The region experiences the same human, natural, and economic development needs. The region as a unit promotes the public safety, general welfare, and the economic prosperity for our citizens.

The region is tied to and accounts for the relationship with our geographic and topography, the existence of our agricultural, rural and urban development. The region has uniform physical, social, and economical problems regional in nature.





Structure of the Northeast Missouri Regional Planning Commission

STRUCTURE

An Executive Board of Directors that is appointed from the general membership governs the Commission/Corporation. The Executive Board is comprised of one county elected official, or their designee, from each of the six counties and one city elected official, or their designee, from each of the six counties. The NEMO Executive Board consists of 13 total members.

MEMBERSHIP

The membership of the Commission/ Corporation consists of local units of governments within the region boundaries. Membership is on a voluntary basis. The members are assessed a membership fee based on population and are assessed on a calendar year. The operating budget is generated through income the commission can collect from program administration of State and Federal programs and contract services. The funds generated from the assessments are used to match the various state and federal programs as well as the State of Missouri Office of Administration's grant for the services performed for the region.

Scotland County Public Housing Agency (SCPHA)

The Scotland County Public Housing Agency (SCPHA) administers Housing Choice Vouchers for U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development in Adair (excluding the City of Kirksville), Clark, Knox, Schuyler and Scotland Counties. SCPHA has 329 vouchers available monthly for assistance.

The rules and regulations of the Section 8 Housing Programs are determined by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD). The Scotland County Public Housing Agency (SCPHA) sets policies, procedures and requirements for tenant selection, inspections, and terminations based on those regulations.



The Section 8 Housing Choice Voucher Program is designed for low-income families who wish to live in homes, apartments or mobile homes in the private rental market, but who cannot afford market rental rates. The mission of the Scotland County Public Housing Agency is to meet the emerging, affordable housing needs of low to moderate income individuals and families while promoting self-reliance and improving their quality of life.

The primary objectives of the Section 8 Housing Choice Voucher Program are:

- To assist families in finding affordable housing.
- To ensure that the unit meets Housing Quality Standards
- To assist families with rental payments



A family is any person or persons whose head or spouse is at least 18 years of age or an emancipated minor and is income-eligible, a citizen or a non-citizen who has eligible immigration status. SCPHA's criminal policies do not allow eligibility for any applicant who has committed any felony, violent crime or alcohol/drug related violation in the last three years or is a registered sex offender.

Once a family is issued a voucher, they have up to 120 days to lease a unit. When a family identifies a unit, the agency will inspect the unit to determine that it meets the voucher program minimum housing quality standards. The rent must be reasonable, that is, consistent with market rents for similar units in the local area.

The family's rent is based on total family income. A family with a voucher usually contributes 30% of their monthly-adjusted income for rent and utilities. When a voucher family moves into a new unit, the family may not pay more than 40% of their income for rental and utilities. Housing subsidy is paid directly to the landlord by the PHA on behalf of the participating family. The family then pays the difference between the actual rent charged by the landlord and the amount subsidized by the program.

SCPHA is always looking for new rentals. Benefits to landlords that participate in the Section 8 program:

- Increase the number of renters who can afford a property. Although the contract is between the landlord and renter, the Section 8 voucher pays a portion of the rent.
- Bi-yearly inspections by our trained inspectors help the landlord ensure that the rental unit is safe and meets current housing standards.
- Landlords are encouraged to screen Section 8 applicants with the same background investigation used on any other tenant.
- Inclusion in the program does not prohibit a landlord from renting to a tenant who does not use Section 8 voucher assistance.

Scotland County Public Housing Agency (SCPHA)

Scotland County Public Housing Agency Complex Management

SCPHA also manages the Conkle Street Apartments in Brashear, MO on behalf of the NEMO RPC. This is an 8 unit, 3-bedroom duplex built by NEMO RPC in 2013.

CONKLE STREET APARTMENTS

Conkle Street Apartments (Brashear Rentals), Brashear MO, are owned and managed by Northeast Missouri Rural Development Corporation/Regional Planning Commission. The rentals are totally electric. The HVAC system includes central air and heat pump. Seven (7) units are two (2) story duplexes with three (3) bedrooms and full bath upstairs and kitchen, dining area, full bath, laundry and living room downstairs. One (1) unit is a one (1) story ADA compliant three (3) bedroom unit.

Electric range, electric dryer, washer and refrigerator appliances will be provided. Rent is currently \$475 per month. All utilities, except trash pickup, are the responsibility of the tenant. All tenants must meet eligibility requirements and comply with all obligations/regulations. It is our policy that tenants be at least 18 years of age and able to enter into a lease.

Section 8 vouchers may be available if needed. The target population for this project are families in need of safe and affordable three-bedroom homes (single or two-parent households). The site is easily accessible by either walking or personal vehicle. The local Adair R-II, K-12 public school system is located in the Northwest corner of the city limits.

Northeast Missouri Revolving Loan Fund Program

Northeast Missouri Regional Planning Commission (NEMO RPC) continues to assist businesses and industries in the creation of new jobs and the retention of existing jobs for Northeast Missouri. In 2004 the NEMO RPC created the Northeast Missouri Revolving Loan Fund (RLF), which consists of the Intermediary Relending Program (IRP). NEMO RPC, in partnership with USDA-Rural Development established the program to fill financing gaps not covered by conventional lenders.

Small businesses and start-up enterprises often have difficulty borrowing all the money necessary to finance fixed assets, inventory, working capital, etc. from traditional financial institutions. Since 2004 the funds have been used for: Business acquisitions, construction and enlargement; repair, modernization and development costs; developing land, building facilities or materials; machinery, equipment and inventory. While certain restrictions exist, the NEMO RLF is designed to provide financing for businesses which cannot obtain adequate funds from conventional sources.

Applicants may be individuals, public or private organizations, or other legal entities, with authority to incur the debt and carry out the purpose of the loan. The business must be located in one of the counties of Adair, Clark, Knox, Lewis, Schuyler and Scotland in Northeast Missouri and be located in communities of less than 50,000 population. Funds must be used for various costs associated with starting, acquiring, operating or expanding qualifying businesses, such as but not limited to:

- Business construction, expansion, repair, modernization or development;
- Purchase/development of land, buildings, machinery, or supplies;
- Startup costs and working capital;
- Pollution control and abatement;
- Refinancing construction financing



Hazard Mitigation



Hazard mitigation is defined by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) as any action taken to eliminate or reduce the long-term risk to human life and property from hazards and their effects. This is crucial to the residents, businesses, and governments of Missouri. The State of Missouri Emergency Management Agency and local agencies such as the Northeast Missouri Regional Planning Commission work with county governments and municipalities to establish hazard mitigation plans, the only phase of emergency management specifically dedicated to breaking the cycle of damage, reconstruction, and repeated damage.

Hazard mitigation activities may be implemented prior to, during or after an incident. It has been demonstrated that hazard mitigation is most effective when based on an inclusive, comprehensive, long-term plan that is locally developed before a disaster occurs. The Robert T. Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance Act provides that local governments undertake a risk based approach to reducing risks to natural hazards through mitigation planning. The completion of these updated plans every 5 years, allows for jurisdictions to apply for Hazard Mitigation Grant Program, which provides funds following a Presidential disaster declaration, for eligible mitigation activities that reduce losses, protect life and property from future disaster damages. Grant applications must be submitted to the state and then the applications are sent to the federal level for the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) approval.

Each county commission and the city councils within the county will be responsible for adopting the county hazard mitigation plan. These governing bodies have the authority to promote sound public policy regarding mitigation of natural hazards. Once the plan has been adopted, the county commissioners

will be responsible for submitting it to the State Hazard Mitigation Officer at Missouri State Emergency Management Agency. The Missouri State Emergency Management Agency will then submit the plan to the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) for review. Upon acceptance by FEMA, Adair County will gain eligibility for Hazard Mitigation Grant Program funds.

The hazard mitigation planning committee members are responsible for the annual review and update of the plan. The planning committee shall be a standing committee, and shall be composed of representatives from various government agencies, county officials, city employees, utility service employees, emergency responders and planners, regional planners and any concerned county residents. It is the responsibility of the legislative bodies of the participating communities to ensure that the planning committee meets regularly, at a minimum of annually.



As of March 2018, Missouri has had a total of 59 federal Presidential Disaster Declarations and 10 Emergency Disaster Declarations since 1957.

Across the United States, natural, manmade, and other disasters have led to

increasing numbers of deaths, injuries, property damages, and disruptions of business and government services. This can take an immense toll on people, businesses and government, especially in these challenging economic times. The time, money and effort to respond to and recover from disasters divert public resources and attention from other important programs. Missouri recognizes the consequences of disasters and the need to reduce the impacts of natural, humancaused/technological, and other disasters.

People and property in Missouri are at risk to a variety of hazards. Among other hazards, Missouri is at risk to tornadoes, floods, drought, earthquakes, severe winter weather, and wildfires. These hazards have the potential to cause widespread loss of life and damage to property, infrastructure, and the environment. Missouri recognizes the potential consequences of disaster events. The need to reduce these impacts through property planning and preventative measures is of great importance to the State and its residents.

NEMO Solid Waste Management District, Region C

The State of Missouri Solid Waste Districts were created and authorized by the State of Missouri Solid Waste Act of 1992, Revised Mo Statutes. The Northeast Missouri District was formed in 1993 under these statutes with an appointed Solid Waste Council from the County Commissions of Adair, Clark, Knox, Lewis, Schuyler and Scotland counties. The NEMO Solid Waste District Council membership is set by statutes as two representatives from each county, and one representative from each incorporated community over the population of 500. From the Solid Waste council an Executive Board of Directors is elected consisting of twelve members.

The NEMO Solid Waste Management District, Region C, has no employees and contracts with NEMO Regional Planning Commission to perform administrative duties assigned by the Missouri Department of Natural Resources. NEMO RPC staff

NEMO RECYCLING

The cities of Canton and Memphis operate drop-off collection facilities for most recyclables in their areas. The City of Memphis also offers cardboard collection, both as drop-off and commercial pick-up services. Community Opportunities offers two drop-off locations in Kirksville. The City of Kirksville offers a curbside recycling pick-up program which includes glass. For citizens outside the City of Kirksville there is a glass drop off located at the Community Opportunities facility. The City of Kirksville offers a Household Hazardous Waste Collection program for residents. Larger grocery and department stores have containers available for drop-off of plastic shopping bags and plastic film. Auto parts stores such as O'Reilly's and AutoZone collect and recycle used motor oil and lead acid batteries. Walmart in Kirksville collects used small printer ink cartridges for recycling and Home Depot has a collection program for rechargeable batteries.

devotes time toward the development and implementation of a solid waste management plan for the six-county area and oversees the regulatory and administrative documents necessary to stay in compliance with state statutes.

The NEMO Solid Waste Management has funded numerous projects since 1993. These grants have awarded funds in an amount exceeding \$2,000,000 toward recycling efforts in the six-county area of Northeast Missouri. Those funds have enabled businesses and non-profit organizations to implement projects promoting principals of recycle, reduce, reuse that otherwise would not have been possible. Projects that involve recycling may be eligible for a grant from the NEMO Solid Waste District. The grant cycle is typically advertised one or two times prepare with project implementation beginning upon DNR approval.

Region C 's main goal is to encourage new projects that divert materials from going to the landfill. Region C awarded 3 grants in FY2018 and 3 grants in FY2019 to encourage recycling in our communities and make recycling more accommodating.

We are interested in any projects developing uses for collected materials. As a district we would also like to provide more information and education on concerning recycling to the communities and school in our region.

The program's overall goal is to increase recycling in our region. The City of Memphis is collecting more plastic bottles for recycling, diverting significant amounts from the landfill. Truman State University is continuing to find ways to make use of used vegetable oil through Bulldog Biodiesel and Industrial Opportunities is trying to increase the amount of recyclables collected.

Economic Development Administration (EDA)



The Northeast Missouri Regional Planning Commission and Economic Development District works closely with its member governments to improve the economy and living environment of the District. Our Region actively updates the Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy (CEDS) for continuation of the Northeast Missouri Administrative Planning Grant provided by the U.S. Department of Commerce, Economic Development Administration (EDA). To aid in formulating a work program to achieve its goals, the Commission has adopted the following specific regional objectives:

EMPLOYMENT DEVELOPMENT

Work with local governments, local economic development organizations and other agencies/interest groups to promote job creation, economic growth and expansion; Enhance the economic vitality and quality of life of our communities; Research and identify job development needs suitable for review and consideration as projects; Promote and manage the NEMO Revolving Loan Fund (RLF) which consists of the Intermediary Relending Program.



STANDARD WORK PROGRAM ELEMENTS

Work as a member of the Missouri Association of Council of Governments (MACOG) to support all economic development efforts and legislation that will enhance the business community and employment base of the State of Missouri; Attend national, statewide, regional and local meetings to assist communities and organizations and develop professional capacity of the organization; Distribute information to the region announcing funding and training opportunities and policy changes and development; Update the district's website which is live and accessible at www.nemorpc.org.

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT/ TRANSPORTATION

Reassess the adequacy of community utilities/ services and transportation facilities throughout the Region; Determine possible Small Bridge Replacement Projects in the Northeast Counties.



U.S. ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT ADMINISTRATION

NATURAL RESOURCES AND ENERGY

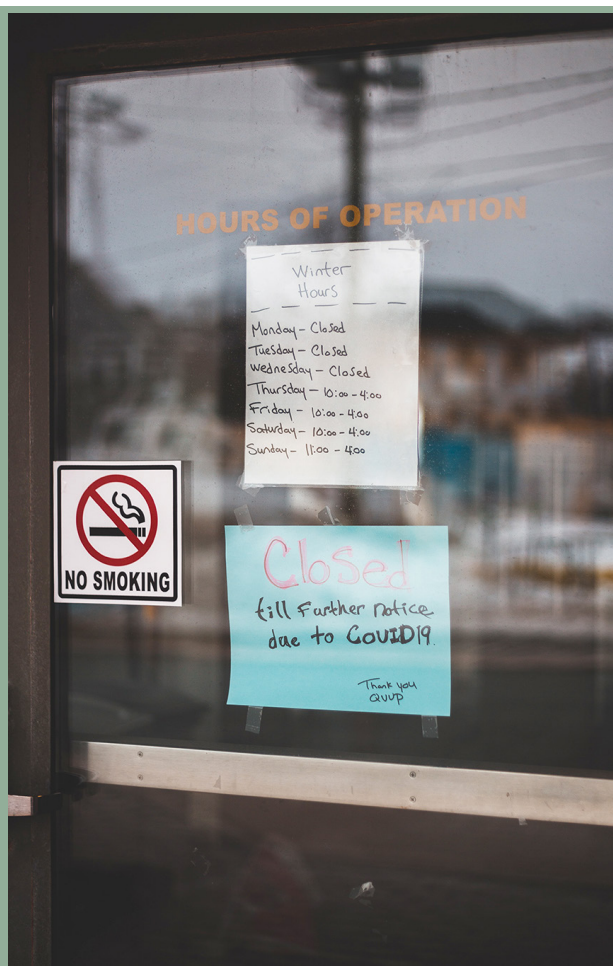
ENVIRONMENT

Update and implement a Solid Waste Management Plan thru the NEMO Region C Solid Waste Management District; Complete necessary revisions to environmental reviews for the Community Development Block Grant applications; Complete the new multi-hazard mitigation plan updates for each County; Distribute the land utilization planning assignment for land use in areas located within flood zones or other high hazard geographic areas.

CARES ACT FUNDING

The Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security ACT (CARES Act) passed on March 27, 2020, and signed by President Trump, established the Coronavirus Relief Fund and appropriated \$150 billion to the Coronavirus Relief Fund. Each of Missouri's counties received an allocation based on population. Adair County received \$2,973,240 in federal Coronavirus Aid, Relief and Economic (CARES) Act funding

NEMO RPC is serving as reimbursement administrator for Adair County. All requests for reimbursement must be necessary expenditures due to the public health emergency with respect to the Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19) incurred between March 1, 2020 and Dec. 30, 2020. NEMO RPC staff will review applications, make sure the request is eligible for funding and verify that the documentation meets the requirements for a Single Audit. A verified application will then be forwarded to the Adair County Commission for review and approval. Those approved will be forwarded to the county treasurer for payment to the applicant. NEMO RPC staff will maintain files for the county and track all requests and expenditures.



Community Development Block Grants (CDBG)

Every year, the State of Missouri enters into a contractual relationship with the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) accepting receipt of the Community Development Block Grant funds. The Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) program offers grants to small Missouri communities to improve local facilities, address critical health and safety concerns, and develop a greater capacity for growth. Funds are offered for projects that can range from housing and street repairs to industrial loans and job training. State CDBG funds are only available to non-entitlement areas (incorporated municipalities under 50,000 and counties under 200,000 in population).



From addressing local health and safety concerns to improving local facilities such as senior centers and community centers, CDBG programs are designed to support your community's wellbeing and greater capacity for growth. Grants are available in a variety of categories and can be utilized for a variety of community development initiatives.

GENERAL INFRASTRUCTURE

This program helps Missouri communities strengthen its local economy by improving local public infrastructure, streets, drainage, and bridges. Reliable and sustainable infrastructure helps support the business community as well as residents.

INDUSTRIAL INFRASTRUCTURE

This program helps communities develop public infrastructure that allows industries to locate new facilities, expand existing facilities, prevent the closing of a facility or the relocation of a facility outside the state. Grant funds may be used for public streets, water or sewer lines, engineering and other public facilities necessary to support the private sector project.



WATER/WASTEWATER

This program helps communities establish or improve local water or sewer systems. Grants may be used for construction that is related to water treatment and distribution, and sewer treatment and collection for publicly owned systems.

DEMOLITION

These grants help Missouri communities with demolition of vacant, dilapidated structures (primarily residential) in blighted areas and that present safety hazards.

WORKFORCE TRAINING INITIATIVE

The Department of Economic Development is now using Community Development Block

Grant funding as part of a new initiative to support job training centers in Missouri. Through the Workforce Training Initiative, DED is making available a combination of CDBG, NAP, and YOP funds to help nonprofit organizations cover the cost of training needs and address gaps in quality job training opportunities throughout the state. EMERGENCY

This program provides assistance to communities to address conditions that pose a serious and immediate threat to the health and welfare of the community. The need must be a serious threat to health or safety, be immediate, have developed or greatly intensified within the past 18 months, and be unique in relation to the problem not existing in all other communities within the state.

DISASTER RECOVERY

These grants assist local communities and other entities with long-term recovery, restoration of infrastructure and economic revitalization related to specific Presidentially-declared disasters.

LONG TERM RECOVERY

These funds are used to assist non-entitlement local units of government in addressing emergency housing, public facility, infrastructure, and business assistance needs that occur as a result of natural or manmade disasters. Such assistance may include, but is not limited to: acquisition/demolition, housing replacement, road repairs, storm water drainage and public facilities.



Community Development Block Grants (CDBG)

MITIGATION

These grants assist local communities and other entities coordinate efforts in mitigation and resilience for future disasters. CDBG Mitigation assistance in areas impacted by recent disasters helps carry out long-term strategic and high-impact activities to ease disaster risks and reduce future losses.

NEIGHBORHOOD STABILIZATION PROGRAM

This program helped Missouri communities acquire, rehabilitate, and resale foreclosed homes to income qualifying persons/families. Resale was limited to persons/families of low, moderate and middle income (LMMI) status.

COMMUNITY FACILITIES

This program helps Missouri communities construct facilities that will serve a large portion of the public with a variety of services. With education and health/well-being programs taking priority, communities can utilize this program to construct senior centers, day care centers, rural health clinics, telecommunications, and 911 services, among others.

BUSINESS DEVELOPMENT

These CDBG programs help communities grow local businesses, attract new ones, and provide crucial capital to spur entrepreneurship. Small businesses play a vital role in our state's economy, providing nearly half of all private sector jobs.

ACTION FUND LOAN

Cities and counties can apply on the behalf of a small business to help them secure capital needed to start-up or expand after they have exhausted all other sources.

INTERIM FINANCING LOAN

Local government can provide a short term loan to certain types of for-profit companies that need funds for start-up or expansion and have exhausted other sources.

MICROENTERPRISE

Through this program, cities and counties can design a revolving loan program to help small businesses grow or to facilitate other revitalizations/redevelopment projects that will result in job creation or retention.

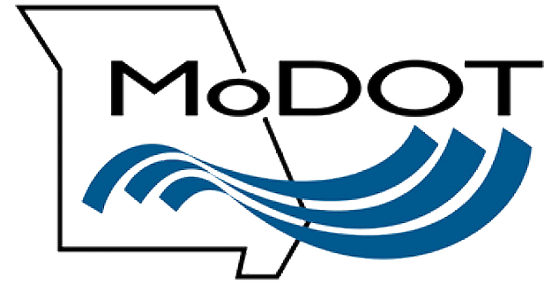

Transportation Planning



One of the key roles of the Northeast Regional Planning Commission is our partnership with the Missouri Department of Transportation, a working relationship that dates back to the early 1990s with the implementation of the federal Intermodal Surface Transportation Efficiency Act, which expanded the transportation planning process to now include a broad range of voices including city and county elected officials, business and industry leaders as well as at-large members of the public. All of this comes together in the form of the Transportation Advisory Council (TAC).



The NEMO RPC TAC continues to meet quarterly to work with MoDOT on prioritizing transportation needs in the six counties. The 2019-20 fiscal year saw some movement on one of those key fronts as progress was made on MoDOT's high priority unfunded road and bridge needs list, where the region has two projects listed: raising the road at Alexandria and improving safety on Highway 15. Work began in the summer of 2020 to widen Highway 15 and add shoulders and rumble strips. Two-foot shoulders and safety strips were added on Highway 15 from the Iowa State line to Memphis. Plans are to do similar work from Memphis to Edina in Knox County and then from Edina to Shelbyville in Shelby County in the next few years. The estimated \$4.5 million project to address road closures due to flooding in Clark County still remains a top priority of the TAC as part of the estimated \$850 million in unfunded needs MoDOT is seeking to address.



Adding turning lanes on Highway 6 for the Knox County and Highland (Lewis County) schools remain on Tier II of MoDOT's high-priority unfunded needs list as they continue to rank high on the TAC's annual project prioritization as does the addition of a turning lane on Highway 63 at the north end of Kirksville.

Disaster Recovery COVID-19

The United States Economic Development Administration (EDA) has a long history of successfully supporting disaster recovery and resiliency efforts. EDA's role in disaster recovery is to facilitate the timely and effective delivery of Federal economic development assistance to support long-term community economic recovery planning and project implementation, redevelopment and resiliency.

EDA is uniquely positioned to coordinate regional disaster recovery efforts in partnership with its extensive network of Economic Development Districts (EDDs), University Centers, institutions of higher education and other partners in designated impact areas, such as the NEMO RPC.

On March 27, 2020, President Donald J. Trump signed the \$2 trillion CARES Act into law. The CARES Act provides EDA with \$ \$1.467 billion available for grant making. On May, 7, 2020 U.S. Secretary of Commerce Wilbur Ross announced that the Department's Economic Development Administration (EDA) would begin accepting applications from eligible grantees for Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act (CARES Act) supplemental funds (EDA CARES Act Recovery Assistance) intended to help communities prevent, prepare for, and respond to coronavirus.

Examples of projects that EDA may fund through its CARES Act Recovery Assistance include:

- economic recovery planning and preparing technical assistance strategies to address economic dislocations caused by the coronavirus pandemic
- preparing or updating resiliency plans to respond to future pandemics
- implementing entrepreneurial support programs to diversify economies
- constructing public works and facilities that will support economic recovery, including the deployment of broadband for purposes including supporting telehealth and remote learning for job skills.



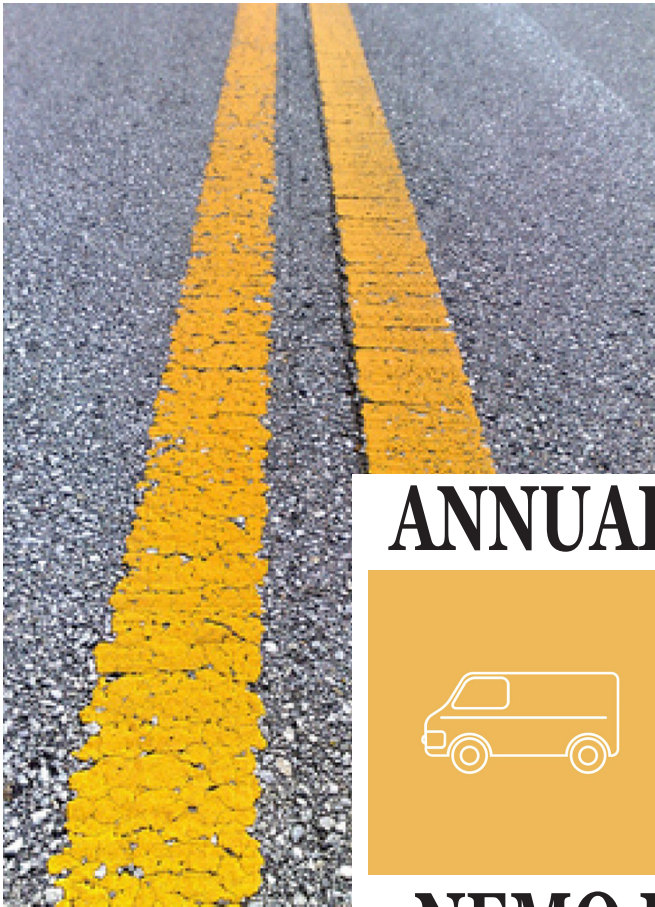
As summer wound down, EDA through the CARES Act Recovery Assistance provided a supplemental financial assistance award of \$400,000 to the Northeast Missouri Regional Planning Commission, of Memphis, Missouri, to help them respond to the unusual and compelling urgency of the coronavirus pandemic.

As a result of the successful EDA CARES Act Recovery Assistance two-year grant, the Northeast Missouri Regional Planning Commission will offer assistance in programs with the U.S. Department of Commerce, Economic Development Administration (EDA), Missouri State Emergency Management Agency (SEMA), and the Missouri Department of Economic Development Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) as well as other technical activities for the Northeast Missouri Rural Development Corporation and Economic Development District (EDD).

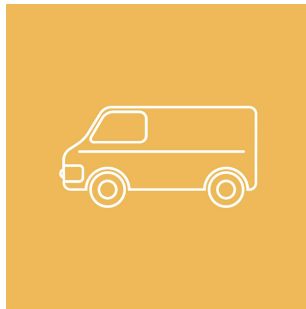
Services that the NEMO RPC hopes to offer in 2020 and 2021 through the grant include:

- Meeting with cities and counties to determine needs or potential projects within the region.
- Organizing critical community support.
- Making presentations before public bodies and community groups.
- Researching and securing sources of pre-development, construction and permanent financing from public and private sources.
- Working with public agency staff to assure timely public review and approval including environmental and other entitlement reviews.
- Identifying and writing grant applications.
- Organizing, coordinating, and documenting project activities.
- Preparing, updating and adhering to project timelines and schedules.
- Performing outreach duties and public relations work as needed; attending community meetings, public hearings, and city council meetings.
- Development of an economic recovery and resilience plan, tied to the applicant's approved Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy addressing the economic impacts of the coronavirus pandemic
- Aid on the provision of technical assistance, as necessary, to local governments, businesses, and other stakeholder organizations;
- Funding the appropriate technology and staff support for these pandemic-response activities.

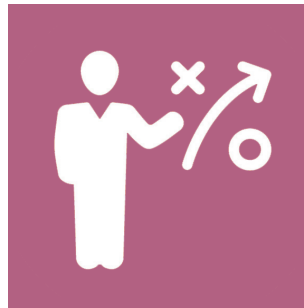
