



NEMO RPC applied for more than \$13 million in grant aid in FY2024/25.







HEN Operational Highlights

Following an incredibly successful debut of the Housing Enhancement Northeast (HEN) program, NEMO RPC was awarded a second \$1 million appropriation by the Missouri legislature to help build much-needed workforce housing in our region.

After completing two new homes in Year #1 of the program, output has doubled in 2024 and 2025 with an average of four new houses being constructed annually.

▼ 3 months

The majority of the new homes are under contract to a buyer prior to completion, with the average time on the real estate market overall of less than three months.

Safe Streets For All



The NEMO RPC Comprehensive Safety Action Plan was completed during FY25, culminating a \$250,000 Safe Streets For All (SS4A) grant from the Federal Highway Administration. NEMO RPC also partnered with the City of Kirksville during this same timeframe to complete the Road Safety Audit project for the US 63 alternate route. The project was performed as part of a supplemental \$120,000 FHWA grant within the SS4A program to be included in the safety action plan.




US 63 Road Safety Audit




Fatal/Serious Crashes on region's Minor & Low Volume routes

Public Housing Agency

The mission of the Scotland County Public Housing Agency is to meet the emerging, affordable housing needs of low to moderate income individuals and families while promoting self-reliance and improving their quality of life.

The SCPHA administers Housing Choice Vouchers for U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development in Adair (excluding the City of Kirksville), Clark, Knox, Schuyler and Scotland Counties.

Solid Waste Management District C

The governing board of the Solid Waste Management District Region C and Missouri DNR approved three grants in the NEMO RPC region for FY2025 requesting a combined total of \$66,520 from the district.

Grant funds will be used by the City of Kirksville to purchase tables and benches made from recycled materials for three city park sites; playground equipment made of recycled materials for the Life Church Fun Factory Daycare in Kirksville; and by Industrial Opportunities in Kahoka for the purchase of a plastic perforator machine to be used in recycling of plastic bottles.

Solid waste tonnage fees are paid by operating solid waste landfills and solid waste processing facilities located in Missouri and deposited into the Solid Waste Management Fund.

The revenues allocated to each of the state's 20 solid waste management districts is based on the tonnage fee revenues generated within each district. In FY 2023, Region C Solid Waste management received \$95,000 as part of the state's \$8,258,660 distribution to the state's solid waste management districts.







Community Development Block Grants

NEMO RPC assisted with 5 Community Development Block Grant projects during FY25 totaling more than \$1.5 million in federal funding.

The staff assisted with 7 new CDBG applications in the 2025 open cycle with total project costs of nearly \$2.7 million. Awards are pending.

Emergency Demolition

Community Name: City of Memphis

Award Amount: \$59,875

Project Description: The property at 101 E. Monroe Street in Memphis partially collapsed during inclement weather, likely related to the advanced age of the structure, creating a public safety hazard for pedestrians and motorists as well as adjoining properties.



The City of Memphis completed an emergency demolition of the remaining structure to remove the public safety threat an uncontrolled collapse poses for civilians and adjacent structures, as well as the removal of the debris to allow access to stabilize the attached properties and remove structural pressure on the walls and foundations of the remaining structures to prevent additional damage and remove the public safety threat of additional structural collapses.

Project Description: The City of Lancaster, in partnership with the individual property owners, removed slum and blight from the community through the demolition of eight uninhabitable residential buildings and six commercial buildings, where rehabilitation was not feasible.

Exhibit Overview


From September 14 through October 26, 2025, the Northeast Missouri Regional Planning Commission hosted Voices & Votes: Democracy in America, a Smithsonian Institution Museum on Main Street traveling exhibition. Memphis was one of only six towns in Missouri selected to present this nationally

recognized exhibit, which highlights how Americans have taken part in civic life throughout our nation's history.

The exhibition explored broad themes such as community participation, civic responsibility, and the many ways people contribute to public life. Hands-on components, historical examples, and interactive displays invited visitors of all ages to consider how individuals and groups help strengthen their communities.

In addition to the Smithsonian content, NEMO RPC developed local-history displays featuring unique stories from Scotland County and the surrounding region. These ancillary exhibits celebrated the long-standing tradition of volunteerism, community service, and local initiative that continues to shape Northeast Missouri.

A variety of public programs, tours, and school visits accompanied the exhibit, offering opportunities for learning, reflection, and community connection. The event served as a celebration of local heritage and a reminder of the positive impact people can make when they work together.





HAZARD MITIGATION PLANNING

Hazard Mitigation Planning is an essential process that helps communities identify their natural hazard risks, such as floods, severe storms, drought, and earthquakes, and develop long-term strategies to reduce future losses. By understanding where vulnerabilities exist and planning ahead, communities can take proactive steps to protect residents, infrastructure, and public resources.

A Hazard Mitigation Plan (HMP) is developed through collaboration with local governments, school districts, emergency responders, utilities, and other stakeholders. It incorporates public input, past disaster data, risk assessments, and practical mitigation actions such as storm-sirens, flood-resistant construction, safe rooms, updated drainage systems, and community education programs.

Northeast Missouri Regional Planning Commission supports local governments throughout this process by navigating FEMA’s regulatory requirements, coordinating stakeholder involvement, and guiding the technical components of the plan. This allows communities to focus on their most important responsibilities of identifying risks, prioritizing needs, and planning for disasters while NEMO RPC handles the procedural and compliance elements required by state and federal guidelines.

Maintaining a FEMA-approved Hazard Mitigation Plan is not only good planning. It is required for eligibility to apply for FEMA Hazard Mitigation Assistance grants. These grants fund projects that reduce long-term disaster risk, including buyouts of flood-prone properties, tornado safe rooms, storm sirens, culvert upgrades, slope stabilization, power redundancy improvements, and other community-protection measures.

By keeping the Hazard Mitigation Plan up to date, our communities strengthen resilience, prioritize high-impact projects, and ensure continued access to federal funding that helps protect lives, property, and essential services.



DISASTER ASSISTANCE

On September 21, 2023, a Major Disaster Declaration (FEMA DR-4741) was issued for the State of Missouri following a period of severe storms, straight-line winds, tornadoes, and flooding that occurred July 29 – August 14, 2023. The declaration provided Public Assistance (PA) funding to 33 counties, including Knox County and Scotland County, as well as Hazard Mitigation Grant Program (HMGP) eligibility statewide.

The declaration followed joint federal–state–local Preliminary Damage Assessments (PDAs), conducted between August 16 and September 1, 2023, which documented widespread infrastructure impacts, washed-out roads and culverts, emergency protective measures, and other damages beyond the capacity of local governments to manage without federal support.

To help Knox and Scotland Counties successfully navigate the complex FEMA Public Assistance process, NEMO RPC provided comprehensive technical assistance from initial damage documentation through closeout of eligible projects. This support allowed county officials to remain focused on emergency response, road repairs, and community recovery while ensuring full compliance with FEMA requirements.

Scotland and Knox Counties combined were awarded over \$700,000 in Public Assistance funding to repair damage caused by severe storms in 2023.

Having a FEMA-approved Hazard Mitigation Plan in place, coupled with the Major Disaster Declaration, enabled the City of Baring to secure \$20,085 in HMGP funding to install an outdoor storm warning siren.

On August 4, 2023, the City of Baring was struck by a destructive tornado that caused significant damage to homes, public infrastructure, utilities, and essential community services. The tornado created widespread debris, power outages, and communication disruptions, highlighting long-standing vulnerabilities in the community’s ability to receive timely severe-weather warnings.

In the aftermath of the event, Baring was determined eligible for long-term mitigation opportunities through the Hazard Mitigation Grant Program (HMGP). Because Knox County maintained an up-to-date, FEMA-approved Hazard Mitigation Plan (HMP) the community was automatically eligible to apply for mitigation funding to help reduce future tornado risk.

Recognizing the urgent need to improve warning capabilities and strengthen life-safety protections after the 2023 tornado, the City of Baring pursued an HMGP project to install a new outdoor storm warning siren that will provide reliable, community-wide alerts during tornadoes and other severe weather events. With NEMO RPC’s support, the community successfully submitted a complete HMGP application, positioning Baring to secure federal mitigation funding that directly addresses the vulnerabilities revealed by the storm and marking a major step forward in improving public safety, enhancing preparedness, and strengthening long-term resilience for residents of Baring and the surrounding area.




HEN's revenues were driven largely by the sale of two homes, \$970,000 in State funding, and \$860,500 in loan advances. All revenue is reinvested into future land acquisition and construction to ensure continued progress in meeting local housing needs.

Total Expenses

HEN's major expenses include land acquisition, building materials, contract labor, and repayment of loan advances. These dollars are invested directly in local contractors and businesses, making HEN a program that builds communities, not just houses.





Future Roadmap

2026

January

Outreach and engagement to both current members and new prospective members, including associate members, to support annual membership dues renewal and enrollment.

February

Multi-Jurisdictional Hazard Mitigation Plan drafts for Scotland and Knox Counties are scheduled for submission to SEMA and FEMA for review in February.

April

The Community Development Block Grant open cycle typically begins in April with applications accepted until September for demolition, community facilities and general infrastructure.

March

The Notice of Funding Opportunity for FHWA's Safe Streets For All (SS4A) program has opened annually in March with a deadline for grant applications in June.

May

MoDOT traditionally opens the call for Transportation Alternative Program (TAP) grant applications during the month of May for sidewalk and trail projects.

City of Kirksville Honored with 2024 Impact Award for Innovative Tiny Homes Project

The City of Kirksville was recognized with a 2024 Impact Award during the NEMO RPC Annual Meeting for its transformative Tiny Homes Project. This initiative is revitalizing a formerly neglected mobile home park into a vibrant community of affordable housing, addressing critical needs identified in a 2022 Kirksville Housing Study.

The \$396,240 project, funded with 50% matching contributions, exemplifies a community-centered approach to solving housing challenges. The City has partnered with the Kirksville Area Technical Center, providing 32 students with invaluable hands-on construction experience while helping to address the city's affordable housing shortage. The Tiny Homes Project is a testament to Kirksville's commitment to sustainable progress and visionary solutions for regional challenges.

Lewis County Regional Port Authority Receives 2024 Impact Award for Port Infrastructure Development Program

The Lewis County Regional Port Authority was honored with a 2024 Impact Award at the NEMO RPC Annual Meeting for its transformative \$11,091,844 Port Infrastructure Development Program. This ambitious project is set to enhance supply chain reliability, create workforce development opportunities, and improve the safety, resilience, and efficiency of port operations in the region.

The project will establish a new dry bulk cargo handling facility along the Mississippi River in Lewis County. Key elements include the construction of a 200-foot cargo dock, 1.62 miles of access road, and a 400-linear-foot conveyor system, along with associated cargo handling equipment. These enhancements will accelerate the movement of goods and bolster regional economic growth by improving infrastructure vital to the supply chain.

This port improvement initiative showcases Lewis County's commitment to advancing infrastructure and supporting economic resilience in Northeast Missouri.

2024 ANNUAL MEETING

The 2024 Impact Awards honor outstanding initiatives that drive innovation, foster community development, and create lasting positive change across Northeast Missouri. City of Memphis & Scotland County R-1 Schools Honored with 2024 Impact Award for Collaborative TEAP Grant Effort

The City of Memphis and Scotland County R-1 Schools were recognized at the NEMO RPC Annual Meeting with a prestigious 2024 Impact Award. The City and School District were honored for their collaboration on the Lovers Lane Transportation Engineering Assistance Program (TEAP) Grant. The \$15,000 grant, funded with \$12,000 from the Missouri Department of Transportation (MoDOT) and a \$3,000 match split between the City of Memphis and Scotland County R-1, supported an engineering study of Lovers Lane in Memphis. The study provided professional parking and traffic flow analysis, as well as intersection and pedestrian safety assessments. These findings included proposed design solutions aimed at addressing congestion and improving safety for the community.

With this groundwork in place, the City of Memphis and Scotland County R-1 plan to jointly pursue additional grant opportunities to implement street improvements informed by the TEAP study. 
